Report of the Connectional Lay Council President

The Board of Bishops and members of the Connectional Council of The African Methodist Episcopal Zion Church

Greetings in the matchless, marvelous and magnificent name of our Lord and Savior, Jesus the Christ. It is with great pleasure, by the grace of God that I come before you to report on the rewarding labors of the Connectional Lay Council. I owe a debt of gratitude to the members of the Executive Board for their zeal and devotion to the work of the council.

The Audit Financial Statements. The CAMS Ministries Firm, Certified Public Accountant. certifies in an opinion letter dated May 11, 2017, that in their opinion, the enclosed financial statements present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of the Lay Council as of December 31, 2016, and the changes in its net assets for the year ended in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

Membership Growth. Lay Council memberships continue to move upward. The total membership increased by 3,530, up from 36,759 to 40,289; and there is an increase of 145 Life Members. The number of Active Lay Councils have increased by 34, up from 1016 to 1050. The percentage of Active Lay Councils has increased from 66% to 74% - up by 8%. The overseas members are tracked through updates given by the presiding bishops. A statistical Membership Report is provided for your perusal.

Education. Throughout this quadrennium, the Education Committee, chaired by Dr. Joyce Perry Edwards, has been proactive in providing support for the educational ministry of the Connectional Lay Council (CLC). The work of the Education Committee primarily has been related to the initiatives and goals included in the CLC's 10th Quadrennial Strategic Plan. Special attention was given to providing information on the Quadrennial Theme: "Fortifying Our Faith While Focusing on Our Future through Worship, Leadership, Discipleship, and Stewardship."

In October 2016, the Committee completed the publication An Effective Lay Council in the Local Church: Ideas for Lay Council Leaders. This 30-page manual was written to provide practical ideas for developing and maintaining an effective Lay Council in the local church. It includes strategies that have been proven effective in organizing and revitalizing Lay Councils and other church auxiliaries. Ideas for this publication were received from laity throughout Zion. The committee secured these ideas by sending surveys to persons within their regions who were active in the Lay Council at the local, district, and conference, and connectional levels.

Additionally, the Education Committee is now preparing for distribution immediately after the 11th Quadrennial Lay Convention a thematic facilitator's guide on the 1st subtheme for this quadrennium: "The Freedom Church: Refocusing on Our Purpose."

Young Adult Initiative. Miss Crystal Baily, Young Adult Initiative Chair has worked diligently with Mrs. Lula Howard to involve young adults in the Lay Council connectional meetings. For the 11th Quadrennial Lay Convention an information flyer was distributed through the regional directors to registering 200 interested Radical Revolutionary Freedom Church loving, trying to be like Jesus Young Adults for Knoxville to the Summer 2017 Quadrennial Lay Convention. Additional efforts to involve young adults include gaining information on their interests through surveys to encourage young adults to become interested and more involved in the Zion church.

Bishop George J. Leake, III Scholarship Fund. Dr. Regina Dancy, Chief Financial Officer of Hood Theological Seminary, continues to keep the Connectional Lay Council updated on the financial activity of the endowed scholarship. The fair market value for the scholarship as of March 31, 2017 was \$55,565.33. The objective of the Connectional Lay Council is to continue funding this endowed scholarship until it reaches \$100,000.

The current "Leake Scholar" is Sister Tami Forte Logan, Traveling Preacher from the Blue Ridge Annual Conference. She completed her Master of Divinity studies in December 2016, and graduated on May 20, 2017 (Summa cum laude - 3.92 GPA). She is a member of the Zion Grove A.M.E. Zion Church, Rutherdfordton, N.C, the Hendersonville Presiding Elder District, and the Piedmont Episcopal district.

Connectional Lay Sunday/Centennial Celebrations. All local societies were encouraged to observe the CLC Centennial Year (1916-2016) during the Lay Sunday observances. Lay Council centennial pins were made available for order through Special Projects. I am exceptionally proud of the many people who supported the Lay Sunday offering recipient, the Harriet Tubman Home, with their financial offerings. The financial goal of \$50,000 was superseded. The Connectional Lay Council raised \$52,000.00 through offerings and donations.

Harriet Tubman Pilgrimage. This year the 43rd annual Harriet Tubman Pilgrimage Celebration was the first, since the ground on which it takes place, was formally established as the 414th unit of the National Park System; Harriet Tubman National Historical Park.

The 2017 Harriet Tubman Home pilgrimage began with the rededication of the Thompson AME Zion Church at 7 p.m. Friday on May 26, 2017. The church was rededicated as the Harriet Tubman AME Zion Church at the ceremony. On Saturday, May 27, I was afforded the delightful pleasure to serve as the keynote speaker for this event. On behalf of all AME Zion church supporters (laity and clergy) of the Lay Sunday offerings and donations; I had the great privilege of presenting a check to Bishop Dennis V. Proctor, Presiding Prelate of the North Eastern Episcopal District/Chairman of The Harriet Tubman Home Board, and Ms. Karen Hill, Executive Director of Harriet Tubman Home, Inc. in the amount of \$52,000 for the Harriet Tubman home.

Launching of the New CLC Website. The Connectional Lay Council contracted with its longtime technology partner, Sirius Networks LLC of Charlotte, N.C. to develop, design and maintain this new, highly technical web endeavor. The newly designed resource pages continue to be one of the most visited areas of the web site, providing items frequently used by the local churches, districts, conferences and Episcopal Districts. The Connectional Lay Council also contracted with Sirius to redesign its logo along with a forward-looking brand strategy that delivered a stunning high-definition new logo package that is sure to be a support to every future creative endeavor.

The Lay Council Logo was accepted during the tenure of Dr. Betty V. Stith and was presented by the late Dr. Coleman DuPont Rippy who was first vice president at the time. The focus is on the Holy Bible of which must be an integral part of our lives and that is why it is placed in the center. "Come With Us to Christ" was our first Quadrennial Convention theme in Charlotte, North Carolina. Black signifies our pride as a race of people. Gold signifies our striving

Eleventh Quadrennial Lay Convention. It is an exciting time for the Connectional Lay Council and we have worked diligently to provide for the edification and needs of all who will attend the convention. We have planned lay academies, and discussion groups that will provide a broad range of options to assist the laity in "disseminating information" and "promoting any other interest of the kingdom of God." The presenters are among the most spirit-filled and talented in Zion. The information they provide will afford everyone the opportunity to continue to develop their skills and abilities as lay leaders and clergy.

The "Fit, Fabulous, & Healthy" 3K/5K Walk/Run. The Walk/Run took place within the various conferences of our 10 domestic Episcopal Districts from June 1, 2016 - December 30, 2016. The Walk/Run was open to all members of the A.M.E. Zion Church, our families, neighbors, and friends. The purpose of this health and wellness event was to raise funds for the 11th Quadrennial Lay Convention charities: The Love Kitchen; which provides meals, clothing and emergency food packages to homebound, homeless and unemployed persons. And the Beck Cultural Exchange Center Knoxville, TN, the place "Where African American History & Culture Are Preserved." The amount raise for these two charities is \$4,752.42.

Necrology. Since we last met, our hearts have been touched with grief as some of our members have fallen asleep. We are grateful to God for the lives and contributions of loyal Zionites who have exchanged labor for reward. Because of their loyalty, dedication and steadfastness, the church prospered. They will surely be missed, but their legacy will live on.

Report on the Financial Statements

Statement of Activities

For The Year Ending December 31, 2016

Note 1- Organization and Purpose

The Connectional Lay Council (CLC) was created to organize the laity of The AME. Zion Church in each Annual and District Conference and local church in the Connection to the end that the objectives of: Deepening the spiritual life, Disseminate information, Cultivating the denomination loyalty, expanding the denomination through education and evangelism and promoting any other interest of the Kingdom of God.

Note 2 – Summary of significant accounting policies

Basis of accounting – The financial statements of the CLC have been prepared on the accrual basis of accounting whereby revenues are recognized when earned and expenditures are recognized when incurred. This basis of accounting conforms to accounting principles generally accepted in the United State of America.

Basis of presentation – The CLC's financial statement presentation follows the recommendations of Financial Accounting Standards Board in Accounting Standards Codification (FASB ASC) Topic 958-205, *Not-For-Profit Entities - Presentation of Financial Statements*. Under ASC 958-205, the CLC is required to report information regarding its financial position and activities according to three classes of net assets: unrestricted net assets, temporarily restricted net assets and permanently restricted net assets. Net assets are defined as follows:

Unrestricted net assets – Unrestricted net assets include resources, which are available for the support of the CLC's operating activities.

Temporarily restricted net assets – Temporarily restricted net assets include resources that have been donated to the CLC subject to restrictions as defined by the donor. These restrictions are met by the action of the CLC and/or passage of time. When the restriction expires as a result of the lapse of time requirement or achievement of the specified purpose stipulated, temporarily restricted net assets are reclassified to unrestricted net assets and reported in the statement of activities as net assets released from restrictions.

Permanently restricted net assets – Permanently restricted net assets consist of endowment and similar type funds in which the donors or other outside sources have stipulated, as a condition of the gift instrument, that the principal is to be maintained in perpetuity, and invested for the purpose of producing present and future income, which may be expended. The CLC currently has no permanently restricted net assets.

Note 2 – Summary of significant accounting policies (continued)

Use of estimates – The preparation of financial statements in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities, the disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements and the reported amounts of revenues and expenses during the reporting period. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

Cash and cash equivalents – For purposes of the statement of financial position and the statement of cash flows, cash and cash equivalents includes balances on deposit in financial institutions, cash on hand and interest bearing money market accounts with an original maturity date of three months or less.

Functional allocation of expenses – The costs of providing the CLC's various programs and supporting services have been summarized on a functional basis in the Statement of Activities. Certain costs have been allocated among the programs and supporting services benefited.

Program services – Comprises activities that contribute to the CLC mission to disseminate information, to cultivate denominational loyalty, to expand the denomination through education and evangelism, and to promote any other interest of the Kingdom of God.

Supporting services – Includes activities such as management and general services required to ensure an adequate working environment, provide administrative support and manage the CLC's financial and budgetary functions.

Income tax status – The CLC is a not-for-profit organization that is exempt from income taxes under Section 501(c) (3) of the U.S. Internal Revenue Code and from state income taxes under similar provisions of North Carolina tax laws. Consequently, no provision for income taxes has been made in the accompanying statements.

Note 3- Temporarily restricted net assets- The CLC administers the Bishop George J. Leaks, III Scholarship Fund. The fund promotes and executes ways and means for providing continuous financial support for A.M.E. Zion Students who are attending Hood Theological Seminary and committed to entering into the ordained ministry.

Notes to the Financial Statements For the Six Months Ended June 30, 2017

Note 1- Organization and Purpose

The Connectional Lay Council (CLC) was created to organize the laity of The AME. Zion Church in each Annual and District Conference and local church in the Connection to the end that the objectives of: Deepening the spiritual life, Disseminate information, Cultivating the denomination loyalty, expanding the denomination through education and evangelism and promoting any other interest of the Kingdom of God.

Note 2 – Summary of significant accounting policies

Basis of accounting – The financial statements of the CLC have been prepared on the accrual basis of accounting whereby revenues are recognized when earned and expenditures are recognized when incurred. This basis of accounting conforms to accounting principles generally accepted in the United State of America.

Basis of presentation — The CLC's financial statement presentation follows the recommendations of Financial Accounting Standards Board in Accounting Standards Codification (FASB ASC) Topic 958-205, *Not-For-Profit Entities - Presentation of Financial Statements*. Under ASC 958-205, the CLC is required to report information regarding its financial position and activities according to three classes of net assets: unrestricted net assets, temporarily restricted net assets and permanently restricted net assets. Net assets are defined as follows:

Unrestricted net assets – Unrestricted net assets include resources, which are available for the support of the CLC's operating activities.

Temporarily restricted net assets – Temporarily restricted net assets include resources that have been donated to the CLC subject to restrictions as defined by the donor. These restrictions are met by the action of the CLC and/or passage of time. When the restriction expires as a result of the lapse of time requirement or achievement of the specified purpose stipulated, temporarily restricted net assets are reclassified to unrestricted net assets and reported in the statement of activities as net assets released from restrictions.

Permanently restricted net assets – Permanently restricted net assets consist of endowment and similar type funds in which the donors or other outside sources have stipulated, as a condition of the gift instrument, that the principal is to be maintained in perpetuity, and invested for the purpose of producing present and future income, which may be expended. The CLC currently has no permanently restricted net assets.

Notes to the Financial Statements For the Six Months Ended June 30, 2017

Note 2 – Summary of significant accounting policies (continued)

Use of estimates – The preparation of financial statements in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities, the disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements and the reported amounts of revenues and expenses during the reporting period. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

Cash and cash equivalents – For purposes of the statement of financial position and the statement of cash flows, cash and cash equivalents includes balances on deposit in financial institutions, cash on hand and interest bearing money market accounts with an original maturity date of three months or less.

Functional allocation of expenses – The costs of providing the CLC's various programs and supporting services have been summarized on a functional basis in the Statement of Activities. Certain costs have been allocated among the programs and supporting services benefited.

Program services – Comprises activities that contribute to the CLC mission to disseminate information, to cultivate denominational loyalty, to expand the denomination through education and evangelism, and to promote any other interest of the Kingdom of God.

Supporting services – Includes activities such as management and general services required to ensure an adequate working environment, provide administrative support and manage the CLC's financial and budgetary functions.

Income tax status – The CLC is a not-for-profit organization that is exempt from income taxes under Section 501(c) (3) of the U.S. Internal Revenue Code and from state income taxes under similar provisions of North Carolina tax laws. Consequently, no provision for income taxes has been made in the accompanying statements.

Note 3- Temporarily restricted net assets- The CLC administers the Bishop George J. Leaks, III Scholarship Fund. The fund promotes and executes ways and means for providing continuous financial support for A.M.E. Zion Students who are attending Hood Theological Seminary and committed to entering into the ordained ministry.
