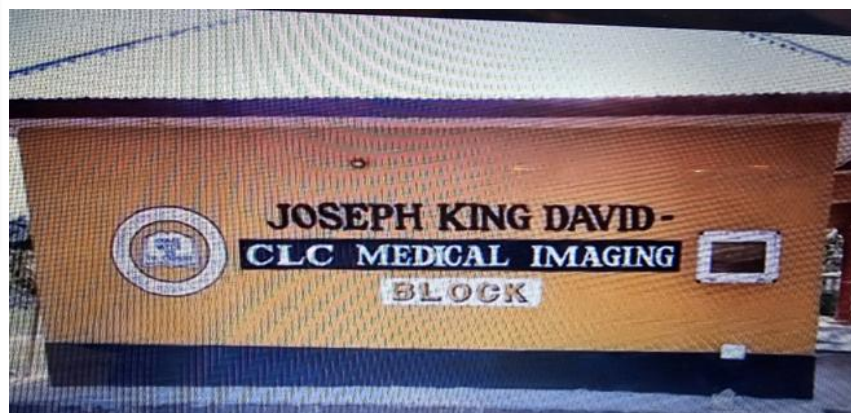
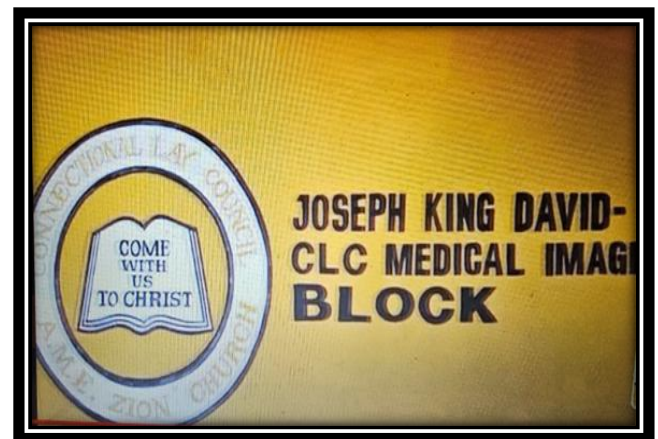
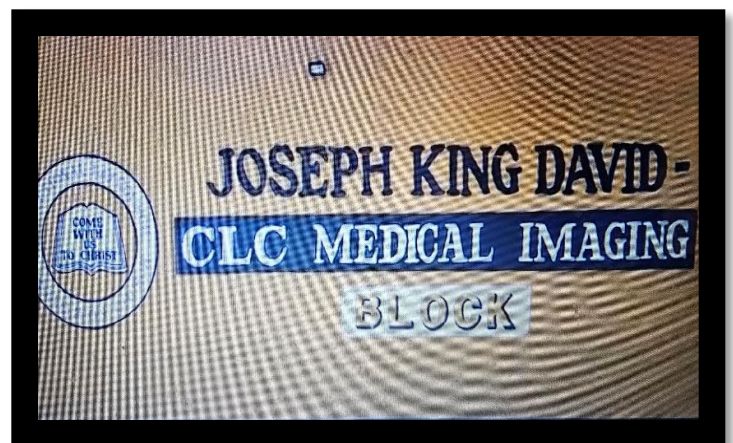
Congratulations!

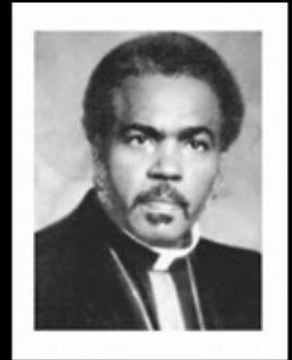

What a gift?

But ye have an unction from the Holy One, and ye know all things. (1 John 2:20)

How many times have you said to yourself, “I *knew* I should have done that,” but instead you allowed your head to override that little voice? That voice is called “spiritual intuition.” Listen, “Your ears will hear a voice behind you saying, ‘This is the way; walk in it’ (Isaiah 30:21 NIV). Listen again, “But ye have an unction from The Holy One, and ye *know* all things.’ (1 John 2:20)

Trusting your spiritual intuition means trusting what you hear, because it’ll tell you: (a) what you need to do. (b) which direction you need to take, (c) what needs to be changed in your life.

What a gift, yet we seldom use it. Why? Because we’re afraid we couldn’t possibly *know* anything without thinking it through, or because it just seems “too obvious.” We think to ourselves, “That *can’t* be right.” Or. “I couldn’t possibly do that.” *We argue for our limitations and behold-they become our limitations!*

You’ve got to learn to recognize and trust your spiritual intuition. It’s your connection to the greatest source of wisdom -God’s wisdom! Don’t be surprised if some of what you discern in your spirit sounds like what you’ve *thought a hundred times before*, and then disregarded.

Listen again, “It is God who works in you to will and to act according to his good purpose (Philippians 2:13 NIV).

The next time your spiritual intuition tells you something-trust it!

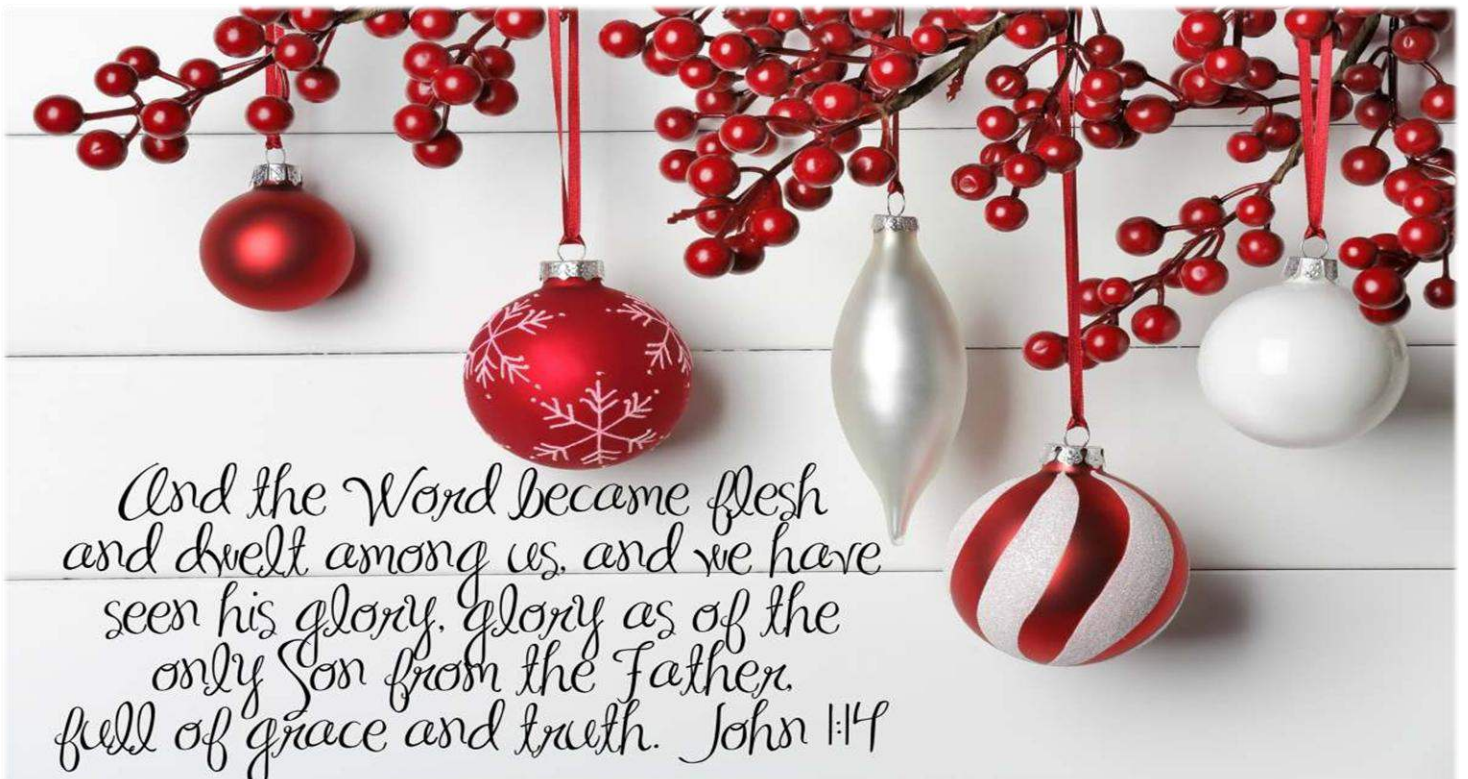

The speaker for the occasion, Mr. Joseph King Davis, Jr. the 12th International President of the Connectional Lay Council, is a member of the St. Mark A. M. E. Zion Church, Durham, NC, and a retired educator who remains active in education even after retirement. He has been affectionately referred to as “an undercover preacher” and he certainly exhibited that quality as he spoke eloquently and passionately to the Goldsboro District during their banquet.



With the Connectional Lay Council’s Third Quadrennial Component, Sharing Our Faith, in mind, President Davis began: “The freedom church, a movement empowered by the holy spirit, from strengthening our fellowship, and now by to sharing our faith, reflects our mission. The black church is now confronted with rising issues that impinge on race and identity. Social concerns such as poverty, gang violence, prison concerns, drug use, unemployment, homelessness, and blatant

racism. There are still serious challenges on the African continent where the AME Zion church has the highest growth, such as financial challenges and health care. All these challenges affect us. Our next level of service requires laity right here in this room to increase our commitment, redouble your efforts, retool, and restore with a strong focus for the task ahead in this quadrennial, as we share our faith. How will the Lay Council share our faith and respond to the pandemic of gun violence that has terrorized many of our communities where our children and adults are being slaughtered right in the street, devastating the families of all impacted by these tragic murders and robbing us of the potential greatness deposited in young men and women? How will the Lay Council secure our future and respond in serving the flock calling for greater accountability from the police department?”

He continued: “We cannot sit silently on the sidelines while our communities are destroyed. We must find ways to restore order and peace and tranquility to our neighborhoods. Our churches should be sacred spaces offering help for families, safe places for youth, and hubs for tutoring and mentoring and character education. To strengthen our fellowship, serve our flock, and share our faith the freedom church much be at forefront of the continuing struggle to eliminate value gaps.”

Further, he stated: “Any success and credit in this work belongs first to God and then to the people who have prayed for it. We must be about praying, praising, and promoting the kingdom of our God. The work of lay ministry is not about me or about you, it is about giving God the glory and the honor.”

“We must keep disciple making and kingdom building at the heart of the church. Even amidst changing events, conditions, and circumstances, God has remained unchanged. God knows God cares, God can, God has, and God will again! God blesses by looking beyond our human faults in order to use us for His glory. His grace has no measure, His power knows no bounds.”

“We must continue to embrace ministry opportunities God has sent our way to lead His people. However, there are some things we must leave behind to secure our future. Leave behind our tears, our tragedies, our tempers, our terrible attitudes, our thoughtlessness, our trials, our tribulations, our trash, and our turmoil to arrive at a place of productivity. Change is not our enemy; change is indeed our friend.”

President Davis emphasized that “The Lay Council must continue to evaluate our position, expand our presence, equip our people, explore our possibilities by communicating a transforming message. We must deliver a message not a mess, we must give people hope rather than a hindrance, we must communicate to convert, change, and convince rather than be conniving or controlling. We must be unified in barriers to build new bridges. It is part of our responsibility to become fishers of men. To help others be productive spiritually, fish for souls and change lives forever. What kind of organization does it take for all of this? It takes a “need conscious” lay council, a gift oriented lay council, a ministry balanced lay council,

a biblical lay council, a motivated and mobilized lay council, and a failure resistant lay council. In order to share our faith, we must be strong advocates and witnesses of the litanies and statements we recite. Are we living our words? Do you really believe what you stand and recite as the Lay Council Affirmation of Laity? Do you believe the Lay Council scripture, Proverbs 3:5-6? Do you believe the Lay Council Closing Prayer, the Lay Council Mission, and the Lay Council theme song? Yes, we have accomplished much as a Lay Council, but our work is still undone!”

President Davis closed with: “Our work is still undone, the poor and oppressed still need a refuge, hope, help, and healing. We still have fight for freedom and human dignity and do it with a spirit of love, faith in God and hope for the future as you serve the AME Zion Church.”

“I pray that God will look upon what I have done here this evening as your lay speaker and accept it as my offering of praise. 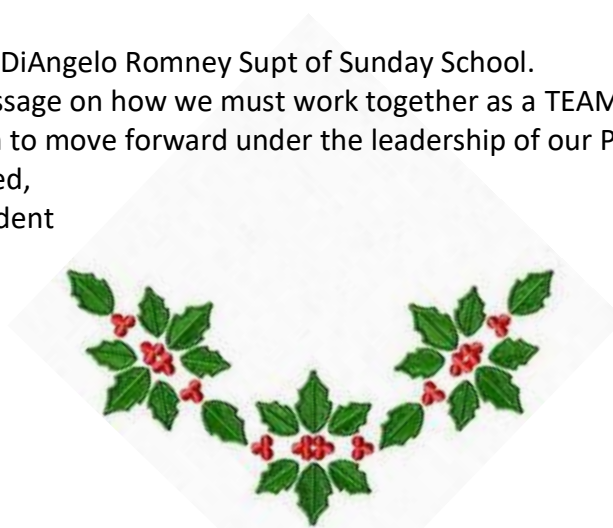

Go outside the four walls of the church. Be relevant. **Encourage**: Give the lay people as well as clergy some hope. Create Jobs, start businesses, really rally the people of God to serve and use the power that is in the lay council. From INFORMED voting to starting Christian OWNED community programs, schools, buying hotels and event venues and serving GOD’S people for real.

Edify: by educating YOURSELF first then the people of God. Start to gather minds for useful dialogue and effective service. MAKE EACH OTHER BETTER. IRON SHARPENS IRON. BUILD YOUR TEAMS and network.

Finally, she challenged all to share their faith, tell their stories. Get creative, write a song or a book, Tell the truth about your failed or successful marriage and the part you played. Expose those sensitive parts of you when you were at your weakest. Demonstrate your faith by the work you do in the Lay Council. **Do a new thing, like working together**. Share your faith by preventing more black bodies from dropping at the hand of law enforcement and negligent health care professionals. Share your faith by actually knowing who and what you are voting for, not just because they claim a certain denomination or because they look like you or the same sex as you or if they represent a certain political party. Share your faith by educating yourself about other cultures and learning to be more open minded. Share your faith by showing love to all people.

Whatever we are doing now, Is Not enough but Jesus has already petitioned for us that our faith will not fail so when you leave here, GO EVANGELIZE, GO ENCOURAGE, GO EDIFY. MAKE IT ENOUGH

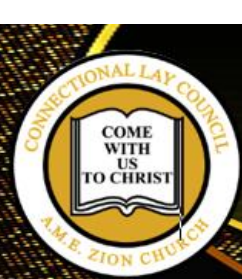

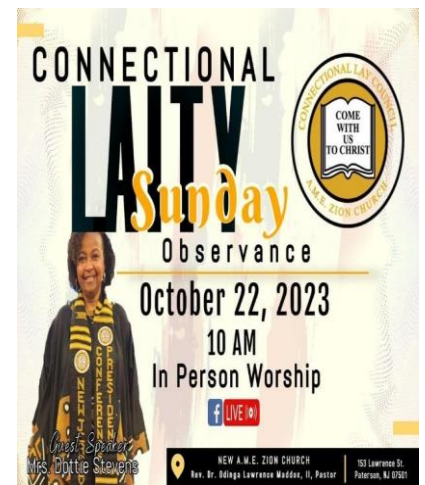

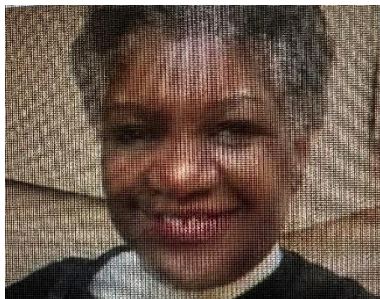

My scripture reference is [1 Peter 1:3-12](#). I will be reading it from the English Standard Version That anchor is our faith. What have you put your faith in? How important is it to have faith? Where do we find a faith strong enough to make it through the storms of life? Peter knows how important faith is and he gives us a great picture of faith, a faith that we can anchor deep with, and a faith which will hold us during the storms of life.

If WE are going to be effective Lay leaders, we must learn to lead because you can't lead where you aren't going. We must lead by example. If our motto is Come With Us To Christ therefore in order for me to share Christ, I must share him possess and have a relationship with him myself Then help somebody as my telling you is helping me.

Here are five simple steps anyone can use to help those who've never met Christ understand what it really means to have a relationship with Jesus: BECOME THE DIFFERENCE THAT MAKES A/THE DIFFERENCE. To share our faith, we should

1. Start with your testimony.

People can debate a lot of things but there is one thing that is not debatable and that is your personal story. If you look in the New Testament, you'll see many examples of people with no theological degrees or biblical training who were the most effective witnesses for Christ. One of the most successful tools you have to reach people for the gospel is your own story.

2. Avoid debates.

When speaking about your [faith](#), stay single-mindedly focused on [Jesus](#), not religion. Jesus –not some religious system – is who changes lives. Don't get sidelined by peripheral issues or secondary things. Instead, focus on who Christ is, what He has done and how Jesus can put all the broken pieces of one's life back together if he or she will trust in Him.

3. Keep it simple and rely on God.

The gospel, in and of itself, is simple. It is about the life, death, burial, and resurrection of Christ. While it's important to have a basic understanding of God's Word to be an effective witness for Christ, this doesn't mean you must know the entire Roman Road or have a theology degree. Memorizing a few verses such as [Romans 10:13](#), [Romans 10:9](#) or [John 1:12](#), is all you need for a reference point to communicate God's promise that if an individual is willing to turn to Him, He will give forgiveness.

4. Be transparent.

If there is anything that's a turnoff in today's society, it's people that come across as disingenuous or unauthentic. Don't shy away from your own struggles, seasons of doubt and uncertainties about God.

5. Ask for God's help.

Are you willing to inconvenience yourself and step out of your comfort zone to reach out to someone who is going through a tough time? Ask God to use you and give you the right words, at the right times. Ask for wisdom on who to talk to and how you should talk to them. Let God lead you and ask Him to fill you with His spirit.

At the end of the day...

...the greatest thing you can do in this life is point someone else to Christ. You can't make a person say "yes" to [Jesus](#) – that's not your responsibility – but you can be a catalyst to help someone understand that his or her whole purpose in this life is to have a relationship with Christ.

God wants to use you. God can use you. You may feel ill equipped, but remember, it's not based on your personality, how well you articulate or how many [Bible](#) verses you know. Rather, it's about your willingness to say, "Lord, here I am. Send me."

On Sunday, October 15th, 2023, I was privileged to be the Guest Speaker for the Varick Memorial AME Zion Church Virtual Lay Council Sunday Service.

In keeping with our Theme for this year "Sharing Our Faith", I chose as my topic, "What Does it Mean to Have Mustard Seed Faith."

The Scripture reference was Matthew 17:14-20. In this scripture, Jesus is approached by a man, who knelt before him and said "Lord, have mercy on my son. He has seizures and is suffering greatly. I brought him to your disciples, but they could not heal him. Jesus said, "bring the boy to me. He rebuked the demon, and it came out of the boy. The disciples were unable to remove the demon from the boy even though Jesus had given them authority to do this very thing, Matthew 10:1" And when he had called unto him his 12 disciples, he gave them power to go against unclean spirits and drive them out". So, when they came to Jesus to ask why they were not able to drive the demon out of the boy, Jesus replied, "Because you have little faith."

The reference to mustard seed faith is seen in Matthew 17 verse 20 when the disciples came to Jesus in private and asked, "why couldn't we drive it out?"

Verse 20 says: He replied, "Because you have so little faith. Truly I tell you if you have faith as small as a mustard seed, you can say to this mountain, 'Move from here to there' and it will move. Nothing will be impossible for you."

Healthy Holiday Safety Tip



As you plan your holiday gatherings and the meals that go along with them, don't forget to sanitize and disinfect as you clean. To stay as healthy and germ and bacteria free as possible we must do more than clean the surfaces of the things we use and in most contact with. When we see dirt and debris, we know how to clean. But we can't stop there. We should do our best to sanitize and disinfect also.

We need to combat what we can't see.

Cold germs can live on surfaces for up to one week, but they lose effectiveness after the first 24 hours. Cold germs on your hands can live for up to one hour. The influenza (flu) virus can live for up to 24 to 48 hours on hard surfaces. The coronavirus can live from a few hours to a few days.

Bacteria can live up to two hours on surfaces like doorknobs, keyboards, and tables. Bacteria doubles every 20 minutes.

There is a lot more to say about germs and bacteria, but we will not address that at this time. Our focus is holiday season is being mindful that a clean surface doesn't mean it is germ or bacteria free. We must also realize that we may not get ALL germs and bacteria, but we can do our best to reduce its life span.

Romans 12:13: "Share with the Lord's people who are in need. Practice hospitality."

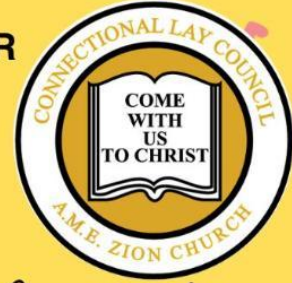

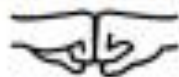

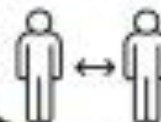
